

Security & Disarmament

PAX's Security and Disarmament work is aimed at reducing unacceptable human suffering in armed conflict. We do this by working on 2 themes:

Strengthening the protection of civilians in armed conflict

The perspective of civilians is often overlooked when it comes to peace and security. PAX connects local security needs and perspectives from conflict areas (like South-Sudan, DR Congo, Iraq and Libya) to local, national and international policy makers and security actors.

Humanitarian disarmament

PAX works on disarmament to prevent the unacceptable humanitarian harm caused by certain weapons. PAX focuses on the whole chain of armed conflict from the development of new weapons, the investments in the producers, the arms trade, to the use of these weapons in armed conflict.

About PAX

PAX means peace. For over 60 years **PAX** has worked together with people in conflict areas and concerned citizens to build just and peaceful societies across the globe. **PAX** works in countries in Africa, Latin America, the Middle East and Southeastern Europe.

What we do

- ♦ Advocate for the **protection of civilians** to be central in the implementation of international security policies
- Work with local partners in conflict areas who strive for political solutions to end violent conflict and promote policies to protect civilians in armed conflict
- Connect local security needs and perspectives to national and international security providers
- Work towards a nuclear weapons free world
- Advocate an end to the use of indiscriminate weapons, like cluster munitions and landmines
- Advocate more effective and stricter regulations for the international arms trade
- Research the impact of toxic remnants of war on civilians and the environment
- Strive towards an end to civilian harm caused by explosive weapons in populated areas
- Critically follow developments in emerging military technologies, like armed drones and robotics
- Lobby for disinvestment from producers of cluster munitions and nuclear weapons

How we work

PAX works on a global scale through indepth primary research and publications; national and international advocacy and education; global campaigning and network coordination.



Norm building

Research and sound analysis on the impact of certain weapons, arms trade and armed violence, are essential to address civilian harm in a sustainable way. We conduct research on the ground, translate the results into recommendations and put these on local, national and international agendas.

Norm setting

Norms are established by research, public campaigning and political debate, and can be implemented by states into treaties The cooperation between civil society and states (civil diplomacy) has proven to be highly effective in this.

Norm compliance

Treaties only make a real impact on the ground if they are strictly interpreted and implemented. The international community and civil society need to stay alert, monitor, push and if necessary name and shame.
